Family Matters: The positive outcomes from Early Intervention

If you want to spend less money on special education in public education, invest in early intervention. If you want to spend less on health issues, invest in early intervention. If you want children to be ready for school invest in early intervention. If you want families to be able to support their children, invest in early intervention.

Fortunately we have decided as a nation to provide early intervention to infants and toddlers through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, or IDEA. The program started in 1986 to support the development of infants and toddlers with disabilities from birth to age 3 to minimize developmental delay and "reduce educational costs to our society by minimizing the need for special education services as children with disabilities reach school age"*. The program takes an interdisciplinary approach, working with children and families in natural environments, and helping families better understand and meet their child's needs. Developmental delays and disabilities are "equal opportunity" and can impact any child and family regardless of race, religion, class, education level or other dimension of diversity. This program has been housed at The Winston Prouty Center since it began in our region. It was originally known as The Family Infant Toddler Program, and is now Children's Integrated Services (CIS) Early Intervention (EI).



Speech delays are one of the most common issues that cause referrals to our Early Intervention program. Imagine you have a child who is not talking at 18 months, not saying "hi" or "bye", "ma-ma" or "da-da", "milk" or "cat" despite all the reading and talking you are doing with her. We know this is a critical time for brain development, and that the circuits in our brains are most flexible during the first 3 years of life, before anyone is even anticipating beginning kindergarten. Identifying a delay and exploring the possible causes is the most important step you can take in making a difference. One child we worked with started receiving services when she was 16 months of age and not yet talking. By the time she exited the program she was age-appropriate in her language and is no longer in need of any services. Last year on average 61% of children exited early intervention with age-appropriate functioning in the outcome areas we measure, and an average of 84% of those who were not age-appropriate had substantially increased their growth – a tremendous indication of the progress that is made.

Life can certainly be more complicated, too! Some children who receive early intervention may never reach age-appropriate function given their disability and will still require special education, although services can be less intensive due to the positive impact of El. A few years ago we worked with a child who had complications at birth which caused significant brain impairment. Although he could not speak clearly, he was able to learn words through picture cards and eventually learned to use a communication device to be able to interact with family, friends and teachers. With appropriate supports he was able to participate full-time in an early learning center program with same age peers and transitioned to kindergarten with everything in place, ready and available to maximize his learning. He began services with Early Intervention at birth, and then worked with special education through the supervisory union from age 3 to 5. If we had waited until he was 5 years old to get started on teaching communication and other skills it would have been more difficult and more expensive to help him learn.

Even more importantly, Early Intervention gives families the skills they need to support their child, which also has a positive impact overall. On our most recent survey 87% of families said that Early Intervention helped them help their child develop and learn. Ultimately one of the most powerful things we can do in our programs is build capacity in others – children, families, colleagues – so that natural systems of support can be as strong as possible. Our goal is to help people have the skills and confidence they need to be successful, and Early Intervention gives children and families what they need to build a strong foundation for more positive outcomes in the future, including having friends and being able to participate as fully as possible in community.

August 1-7 is World Breastfeeding Week

In honor of World Breastfeeding Week, the Brattleboro community will be celebrating breastfeeding during the first week of August. This year the theme is "Sustaining Breastfeeding Together." Here's what been planned:



Gallery Walk Cabana – Located on Main St. in front of Vermont Artisan Designs during
Gallery Walk (8/4): Demonstrates the space and materials needed for a breastfeeding/pumping area at work. This is part of Vermont's Breastfeeding Friendly Employer's project.

Gallery Walk Photography and Slide Show – Located at the Latchis Gallery on Main St. during Gallery Walk (8/4): Local photographer Zachary Stephens, together with his wife Michelle will be showing select images from their photographic project, Nursing Is Normal. The images show breastfeeding mothers and their children in various local settings. Information about local breastfeeding resources will also be available.

The Big Latch On – On Saturday, August 5 from 9:00-11:00 a.m. at Living Memorial Park Playground's Gazebo, Nursing mothers and their infants will gather to join breastfeeders worldwide in support of breastfeeding. There will be a count taken at 10:30 a.m. In 2016, there were 17,992 "latched on" children during this event worldwide!

Displays – The community celebrates breastfeeding with a number of displays in locations throughout Brattleboro including a Main St. banner; window display at People's United Bank; visual celebrations at Brattleboro Memorial Hospital, the VT State Office Building and Brooks Memorial Library; and a series of Life-sized Images of Breastfeeding Moms. Can you find them all? Five cardboard images of women breastfeeding their children will be located around Brattleboro for the entire month.
