Family Matters - The Fourth Trimester

Sally Pennington, RN, mentioned the concept of the fourth trimester on the second episode of 'Family Matters', the talk show where we discuss topics of interest to families with young children. Considering the first 3 months of a baby's life outside of the womb as a critical period of development is helpful in understanding how best to support your child during this time. Going from a dark, relatively quiet place where everything is soft and warm and you are in constant physical contact with your mother to a bright, loud environment where surfaces can be cold and hard, and where you are sometime not touching another living being is a drastic transition. Supporting this transition is key to helping a baby feel safe and secure, and promoting attachment between child and parent. Secure attachment to a primary caregiver promotes social emotional development and the ability for a child to regulate their feelings, leading to a child who is better equipped to handle the ups and downs of the world. Helping families understand the importance of this period and the tools they have for supporting this development in their child is an important part of early childhood services.

Responding to a baby's cues is one of the key elements of supporting secure attachment during this fourth trimester. A newborn is a very competent human being who can make his or her needs known even when we cannot always understand what is needed. When you don't know what to do simply acknowledging that your baby is seeking attention provides reassurance, and remembering that this little person has gone from that dark, warm constant environment to a bright, loud unpredictable one can give you clues about what things to try in order to be responsive. Is the baby cold or hungry, needing movement, needing touch, needing more quiet? Thinking of ways to mimic or re-create the more predictable womb environment is a good start. Talking to your baby about what is happening in as soothing a voice as possible during this period is also key. There is plenty of time for baby to learn to self-regulate as they continue to get used to the world, but the first 3 months post-partum they are relying on primary caregivers to help them feel safe, secure and reassured.

Of course there can be challenges to parents being able to be as responsive as they would like. This can be a time of sleep deprivation, schedule changes, and shifting family dynamics. In addition, mothers might experience postpartum depression or, more broadly, perinatal mood disorders. It is estimated that up to 80% of women experience 'baby blues' for 1 to 3 weeks after giving birth, and that this resolves itself without major intervention. However, for some women anxiety and depression persists which can significantly interfere with attachment if not recognized and treated. It is important for physicians, nurses, home visitors and others who work with mothers of newborns to be aware of this as a possibility and support a mother getting help.

Each family's experience of the 4th trimester will be unique as parents and babies learn to read each other's cues in the attachment dance. As always there is lots of advice lurking out there. Understanding that your primary job as a parent in this time is to help your baby feel safe and secure can help you decide what feels like the right thing for you to do.

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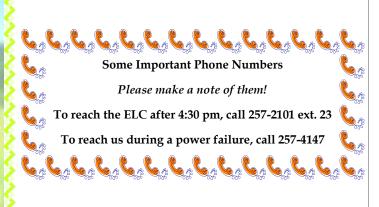

News from Community Based Services

Community Based Services includes; Children's Integrated Services (CIS), Family Supportive Housing (FSH), and the Early Education Initiative (EEI). CIS is a resource for families when they have questions or concerns about their child's development during pregnancy, infancy and early childhood.

Mary is meeting with Laura Bernard , the state point person for Touchpoints. She is hoping to work on planning for Touchpoints training in our community in the near future.

We have posted a position for a full-time family support team member, who will split their caseload between CIS Family Support and FSH Case Management. Emily will be working on transitioning her role to be a part-time Housing Specialist in addition to supporting the administrative functions of FSH and conducting intake meetings for clients referred to the program. Leslie Wilson has been hired by Groundworks Collaborative to work alongside Emily as the other part-time Housing Specialist. She will be starting on 9/29 and will be housed here at Prouty.

The annual Buddy Walk will be held on 10/3 and it benefits the Inclusion Center in Brattleboro.

Please join us in welcoming Willie Gussin to the CBS team! Willie is a familiar face to many of us here, as he previously worked as part of the CIS team as our Specialized Child Care Coordinator through Windham Child Care. For the last year, he has worked as a Family Support Social Worker at Family Services. Willie's role will be to function as part of Family Support with a focus on intake and initial family engagement as a way to triage and support the heavy caseloads in CBS. He started here at Prouty on 9/21 and will be working 20 hours/week. We are excited to welcome him back to our team!

The perinatal initiative group met on 9/10 to discuss the future of the Circle of Mom's groups. We plan to continue offering this group on Tuesdays here at Prouty from 10:45-12. These groups are geared toward moms with an infant 12 months or younger. Those who are interested can come when possible and do not have to commit to attending every week. We will be working on a new brochure that will include a name change to the group. A smaller subgroup of providers will be meeting to look into resources and funding opportunities to continue to offer the group on an ongoing basis.
