Note from Chloe Learey, Executive Director

Building Project Update

As summer begins we continue to explore the possibility of moving to the Vermont Building on the campus of the former Austine School as an alternative to building and renovating at our current location. While there are many moving parts to the decision the goal is for the Board to determine by the end of the summer which direction is most viable for the Prouty Center to pursue.

Right now there are a couple major areas of activity. One is to determine what other organizations are interested and able to join us on campus. We have talked to several people and are hopeful we will have a critical mass of organizations to make the proposal affordable. One of the biggest challenges of a property such as the Austine campus is for a single entity to purchase and maintain it. However, if several organizations can buy into the property, i.e. as a condominium association, it makes it much more feasible. At this point we think 4 or 5 "anchor" owners, including Prouty, will be substantial enough to make it work. This would likely leave space that could be rented by other organizations which may not be able to purchase a space. Currently there are 4 tenants leasing space on the campus, High Five Adventure Learning, The INSPIRE School for Autism, UVM Extension, and The Garland School, all of whom will stay on campus for now, and hopefully long-term.

The other area of activity is assessing the pros and cons of the project based on finances, including what it would take to make the space usable for our purposes. This means inspecting the buildings and doing costs analyses on renovations as well as a comparison of long term costs, among other things. It is exciting to think of revitalizing this campus to be used by multiple organizations; ultimately it has to make financial sense for The Prouty Center in order for us to continue to pursue it.

Last week we had a chance to meet with Senators Balint and White, as well as our legislator, Valerie Stuart, and talk with them about the project. They are supportive and excited about the possibilities, and we greatly appreciate their ideas and input as we move forward exploring this opportunity.

Don't Go Hungry this Summer: Farmer's Market Coupons and Summer Meals Available to Help

Isabel and Ana are trying to raise \$4,000 by June 27th, 2015 in order to offset some of the cost of their reunion.

Isabel and Ana Williams were adopted from El Salvador in the 1980's and grew up in the New England area, knowing very little about their past. The sisters had only faint memories of their life in El Salvador.

With the help of an organization called <u>Pro-Busqueda</u>, Isabel and Ana were able to locate their birth mother, Ester, who is alive and living in rural El Salvador. The sisters learned that they had been torn from their birth family during a massacre in 1980 which took the lives of their grandparents. They had been forcibly separated from their family by the Salvadoran military forces who placed them in an orphanage to be put up for adoption. Their birth mother, who survived the attack, tried to get her daughters back but was prevented from doing so and the sisters were adopted to the US.

Summer comes with various seasonal opportunities for struggling families, seniors, and others to get the food they need, including farmer's market coupons, summer meals for children, and the chance to use 3SquaresVT benefits to grow your own food. SEVCA's Family Services staff can help area residents find out about the programs they may qualify for and assist them to apply for 3SquaresVT food benefits.

Many people don't know that 3SquaresVT benefits (i.e. food stamps) can be used to buy seeds and plants to grow fresh fruits and vegetables in their own gardens. This is a great way to stretch limited food budgets. Seedlings can be purchased wherever EBT cards are accepted. Over 40 farmers' markets across the state now accept 3SquaresVT for starter plants as well as fresh produce. For a list of participating stores and markets, visit www.vermontfoodhelp.com. Participating farmer's markets will have a special booth to assist 3SquaresVT shoppers with their purchases.

Farmer's Market Coupons are another great resource that will be available starting June 29 this year. Whether or not a household is already receiving 3SquaresVT, they may qualify for a coupon book worth \$30 to purchase fresh produce or seedlings at their local participating farmer's market. SEVCA will be distributing coupon books to qualified households on a first-come, first-served basis, with a number of coupon books set aside for seniors. To qualify, a household's income must be no more than 185% of the Federal Poverty Level, currently \$2,456 per month for a family of two, or \$3,739 per month for a family of four. Interested households should phone SEVCA at (800) 464-9951 to find out if they qualify. Unfortunately, walk-ins cannot be accommodated. There are a limited number of coupon books available, so interested families and individuals are urged to call as soon as possible.

News from Community Based Services

Community Based Services includes; Children's Integrated Services (CIS), Family Supportive Housing (FSH), and the Early Education Initiative (EEI). CIS is a resource for families when they have questions or concerns about their child's development during pregnancy, infancy and early childhood.

Community Based Services is working with Groundworks Collaborative (formerly Morningside Shelter and the Drop-In Center) to develop a Housing Coordination Program. This would help streamline access to housing by coordinating some of the administrative parts of the housing search so that housing case managers could focus on other work. We are gathering feedback from case managers to see what would be most helpful and hope to move forward soon.

Deb Forrett attended the CIS meeting on Monday 6/22 to provide an overview of her role with Children with Special Health Needs and to answer questions the team had about referrals and changes within the program.

The EI team attended an EI Child Outcomes Rating Training on Wednesday, June 24th.

Alison, Sally and Terrill have been collaborating with Susan Buhlman, Outreach Coordinator at the Brattleboro Retreat, Amanda Pizzollo at the Health Dept, providers at Brattleboro OBGYN, and Loren Cole, a local therapist, to discuss resources for women with perinatal depression and anxiety in our community. These meetings have been a great opportunity to talk about gaps in our system of care and how we can all work together to improve access to treatment and support services. Additionally, a meeting was held to discuss the possibility of holding a support group for mothers with an infant 12 months or younger. Jessica Perkins, a volunteer with It Takes a Village, and Susan Buhlman, have offered to volunteer to facilitate the initial round of these groups. We are hoping they can start in August and run for 6 weeks. The location will likely be here at Winston Prouty. More info will be coming...stay tuned!

Thanks, Sally and Terrill, for participating and devoting your time and energy into these initiatives!!

The YMCA bus has stopped running as of June 15th, following the state centralization of transportation grants. Tonya has been working with Family Services to find a temporary alternative solution for transportation for Protective Service children who were riding the bus. Windham Child Care is currently hiring a bus driver and bus monitor and plans to take over this operation as soon as they have hired for these positions through September 11th. WCCA has interviewed three candidates for the bus monitor position. A bus driver was interviewed last week and another interview is scheduled for this Thursday.
