Note from Chloe Learey, Executive Director

When Plans Change

By now many of you have heard that we are delaying our construction of the building project which we planned to start this spring. While it is challenging to press pause we are doing it for a very positive reason: we may be able to have the space we need in an existing facility with renovations that would cost less than the budget we planned.

This opportunity came in the midst of some hard news. We learned that the cost of the project as designed is \$700,000 over the budget figure we established. It is possible to scale back the project, build what we need and stay within budget, it will just require some rework. At the same time it was recommended that we relocate during reconstruction, so we toured a building on the Austine campus that previously housed the Little Arrows Early Learning program, among other things. As it turned out there is enough space on one floor of that building to accommodate all of the space expansion provided by our project here, which caused us to ask the question "should we relocate permanently?" The Board of Directors and Management Team decided that, in order to be fiscally responsible, we needed to thoroughly explore that option before making a decision about where to expand. So truly the pause is a positive one which will ultimately lead to the better decision whichever way we go.

My son (a Prouty graduate, now 14) has a favorite saying: "When one door closes, another opens, but things sure are hard in the hallway." I am not sure where to give credit for that saying but I find it very helpful in times like this. We are in the hallway, talking about possibilities and opportunities, which is both exciting and stressful. When we think about some of the social-emotional skills we want to help children learn, being flexible, adaptive and responsive to a challenge are certainly on the list, and situations like this ask us to use those skills as best we can. We all have different temperaments and approaches to change and the unknown, and it is important to remember that some of us will find this pause exciting and full of possibility, others who will be worried about risk, some who will be uncomfortable not knowing exactly what is going to happen, and many feelings in between. We strive to create an environment at Prouty which both fosters opportunity and feels secure, and those can sometimes seem at odds with each other. Being in the hallway requires us to adapt and manage the balance, and I know we have the strength to do this as an organization. Ultimately we will expand, carry out our strategic plan and be successful – we just are not sure where we will actually be yet.

Our capital campaign will continue full speed ahead because we will need resources to make the changes we are planning. Our next fundraising event, "Par for the Cause", is our inaugural indoor mini-golf tournament which is replacing the "Taste of the Town". We hope it is fun enough to last for 25 years! There will also be an event for kids on Sunday, May 17th. See information on page 9, buy tickets on-line, and bring your friends – it is going to be a blast!



News from Community Based Services

Community Based Services includes; Children's Integrated Services (CIS), Family Supportive Housing (FSH), and the Early Education Initiative (EEI). CIS is a resource for families when they have questions or concerns about their child's development during pregnancy, infancy and early childhood.

The first 4 workshop sessions for the Renters 101 course were held this month on April 8th, 15th, 22nd, and 29th here at Prouty. There have been 10-15 participants in attendance for each session. Topics have included budgeting, tenant rights & responsibilities, housing search, and application support. These workshops have had guest speakers, including Sara Kagle from VT Legal Aid and Peter Lynch from the Town of Brattleboro. Participants will be given a certificate of completion that can be included with housing applications. Both Emily and Danielle from Community Based Services have participated in developing, organizing and running this very successful initiative!

Brandy was retrained in CLASS – (Classroom Assessment Scoring System) a classroom observation tool that looks mainly at teacher/ child interactions in three domain areas – Emotional Support, Classroom Organization and Instructional Support. She has to take a reliability test (which she has passed twice before) to be official, but then she will be available to do CLASS observations in preschool classrooms in our community.

Brandy and Janice Stockman from EEE are starting a 6 week long Parenting Education Series – Positive Solutions for Families on Tuesday evenings from 5-7 here at Prouty. Dates are: May 5, 12, 19, 26 and June 2, 9. The class provides information on how to promote children's social and emotional skills, and use positive approaches to help children learn appropriate behavior. They will teach strategies to handle daily routines, prevent challenging behaviors, cope with challenging behaviors when they do occur, how to nurture success, and how to have clear and consistent consequences. This program is designed for families with children ages 3 – 6.

CIS EI has had 8 referrals for April and they currently have 79 children on One Plans Children's Integrated Services providers will be attending the next annual CIS Conference on May 13th and 14th in Burlington. Alison, Kellyn and Emily will be holding a workshop on housing with Paul Dragon, who oversees the Family Supported Housing Programs in VT. What can I do to prepare my child for Kindergarten?

Children enter Kindergarten at varying levels across development, no matter the district or region. For some children this transition is smooth, but many experience a few hiccups. My daughter will complete her kindergarten year this June. I can remember the anxiety I experienced around this BIG transition, as a parent, and the hiccups she experienced as a student moving into a much larger school community. It is important to acknowledge that this anxiety is natural and that you are not alone (nor is your child).

Families often wonder what they can do to ease this transition to Kindergarten and get their child ready. Listed in the box are a number of simple things that you can do with and for your children to prepare your child a little better. Most importantly, you can know your children. Know what they can do around the concept of number or alphabet. Know what social situations may present challenges for them and where they might excel. Every child is unique and special, there will be growth. Create a positive space for them to show us what they know – open communication with their teaching team from day one is the best advice I can give. You are the expert on your child!

Many districts have begun their transition to Kindergarten activities, if your child is entering kindergarten and is involved in these activities great – if you are unsure of your districts activities I would be happy to call around and find out how you can join in. ~ By Sara Lovell-Allbee, Early Learning Center Education Supervisor

*Create a consistent daily evening routine (dinner, bath, book and bed) – Sleep is CRUCIAL

*Talk to your child about their day (make it a game, draw about it, talk in the car) – OPEN COMMUNICTION helps create a safe space

*Read books any chance you get!

*Draw attention to written words (in books, STOP signs, Letters in signs – Like Hannaford, or GAS – Environmental text is everywhere)

*Draw attention to numbers (in books, on clocks, on signs, price tags – numbers are everywhere too)

*Count objects (any objects!!! Peas on your plate, trucks driving by, stairs to your door)

*Be consistent with consequences. (This is hard, I know! Stick to your word – once you say it you gotta follow through with it-so only say it if you intend on doing it)
