## Family Matters: Celebrate the Month of the Young Child

Why celebrate "Month of the Young Child"?

In 1971, the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) began celebrating the "Week of the Young Child" during the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of April. In 1985, the Michigan state affiliate, MiAYEC started the Month of the Young Child, and many other states and regions have done the same, including greater Windham County and other part of Vermont. It is a time to focus on the importance of the early years, the needs of young children and their families, and to recognize the programs and services that support them. While early care and education is one of the areas that is highlighted prominently, it is important to consider the range of supports that touch young children, from pediatricians to child protective services, health departments to housing support. One of the hallmarks of working with young children successfully is working closely with families and caregivers as well. I often say that people should not go into working with young children unless they are good at working with adults! Celebrating Month of the Young Child means celebrating families, too.

By now you have likely heard why the earliest years are such a critical time for development. When 80% of a child's brain is developed by age 3, and 90% by age 5, it is imperative that we pay close attention to ALL aspects of a child's life and the environments in which they exist. Early education is what is happening all the time for young children as they absorb the world around them – at home, in the classroom, with other caregivers, at the doctor's office. Conversations about early childhood education often end up focusing on programs, whether center-based or home-based, and certainly this is a primary place that many children spend their days. However, keeping the conversation more broad helps to reinforce that early learning and development is happening across all settings, and it is not so much the setting that matters, but what is happening there to support the optimal development of children.

On the current edition of Family Matters, the talk show where we discuss topics of interest about early childhood, Sueño LeBlond shares her experience as an early educator and someone who is involved with planning this year's Month of the Young Child events in our region. As the Early Education Outreach Coordinator, Sueño interacts with many children, families and providers as she drives around the county in the Early Learning Express. She shares that this MOYC celebration creates opportunities to bring families together and connect them to each other and the community. Raising children is joyful, and can be very challenging! Supporting families to have the tools they need to support their child's development is some of the most important work we can do.

The 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Children's Art Exhibit is a wonderful kickoff for the month, and it is happening at the River Garden in Brattleboro on Saturday, April 2<sup>nd</sup> from 10:00 a.m. to Noon. ## Campus Update

- Available Space several people have expressed interest in renting or buying space on campus and have toured the available options. Available space includes: the lower level of VT Hall, office space on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of Holton Hall, the two dorms, Wheeler House and the President's House. A diagram of the campus is posted on our web site under News/Austine Campus Updates. It is likely the dorms will be rented to educational groups this summer. The middle floor of VT Hall will be storage for now, and will need some renovations before being ready to occupancy. The kitchen will also become available to rent, we hope to multiple users.
- VT Hall Renovations bids are being gathered and decisions will be made within the next week or so about the work on the upper level. We anticipate demolition work to begin the first week of April, and our general timeline for moving remains the same (between the school-year and summer programs in the Early Learning Center). We expect to have an Open House so families and others can see the space.
- Frisbee Golf course this public course is closed for now to accommodate programming on campus with middle school students. We will continue considering how best to allow for multiple uses of the campus in a way that works for different constituents.
- Soccer Field the Ultimate Frisbee team has expressed interest in using the lower soccer field for practice during April and May. Brattleboro Youth Soccer Association has been using this field as well, and this will likely continue.

## News from Community Based Services

Community Based Services includes; Children's Integrated Services (CIS), Family Supportive Housing (FSH), and the Early Education Initiative (EEI). CIS is a resource for families when they have questions or concerns about their child's development during pregnancy, infancy and early childhood.

Alison attended a meeting on March 21st with Cynthia Twombly, VT Dept. of Health, Margaret Atkinson, WCCA, Chad Simmons, Building Bright Futures, and Kurt White, Brattleboro Retreat, to talk through the barriers to providing onsite child care for parents/caregivers who go to the Retreat every morning for medication assisted therapy for opioid addiction. This meeting went very well, and as a next step, Kurt volunteered to draft a short survey that can be given to patients in order to better understand the need/potential need for child care as a barrier to continuing therapy. Once the survey is complete, administered and we are able to see data, we plan to re-convene to discuss next steps.

Chloe and Mary were recently notified by the State CIS Team that our Early Intervention program **Meets Requirements** for the FY 2014 reporting period. Congratulations to our hard-working and dedicated EI Team! In this notification, the State commended our EI program on several fronts, including a survey response rate that was 10% higher than the State target; data that was consistently timely and accurate, particularly the attention to detail and the way our EI Team brings they notice or anticipate to the State's attention in a collegial way; and 100% submission of the required Child Outcome Summary Forms for the reporting year. The State also recognized Brattleboro for being a targeted support region to participate in exploring strategies associated with the State Systemic Improvement Plan. We thoroughly recognize the extra time and effort this commitment requires.

Chloe, Sally and Alison have been reviewing the current structure of the nursing hours and supervision in CIS. Recently we restructured supervision to better reflect our current needs. Lois Trezise, former Midwife at Brattleboro OBGYN, has agreed to provide monthly CIS Nursing supervision, beginning March 7th. We also recently posted a Part-time Maternal Child Health Care Nurse position to work 20 hours a week with a flexible schedule. We are in the process of interviewing for this position.

## **CIS Wish List**

In late January, one of the families in the our community lost their home to an electrical fire. They are in need of a whole host of household items, including diapers, wipes, non-perishable food and a printer (regular home printer to connect to a laptop). Prouty is working with other local organizations to help support this family. Please contact Kellyn McCullough at Ext. 21 for the current list of needed items.

Recently an opportunity has presented itself to potentially receive a donated double-wide trailer that the family could place on their property in Putney. At least \$10,000 needs to be raised in order to transport it to their property, so any and all financial contributions would be gratefully appreciated. # Encouraging Literacy: Stories, FingerPlays and Songs by Amy Fulton

Early literacy experiences are among the most important experiences a child care teacher can provide for children. Children learn about language through their interactions and relationships with their peers and important adults. (Literacy is the ability to read and write to communicate.)

A visitor to any ELC classroom would observe teachers reading to children, singing songs or reciting fingerplays. You would likely see a child sitting in a teacher's lap listening to a story book (board books for EL1). It is often a favorite story read over and over again. This is a wonderful way for young children to learn vocabulary and the prosody (rhythm) of language. They love visually interesting pictures, pointing to objects they recognize or even a favorite character. Labeling the images is just as much fun as reading. One of EL1's favorite stories right now is *Five Little Monkeys*. Sometimes we sing it or we read it - or just look at the pictures. Lately the pictures of bandages on the monkey's head or the mom calling the doctor are very interesting!

Other times we would be seen sitting with a group of children singing a song or reciting a fingerplay. We have circle time every day and sing a variety of favorite songs, which the children often choose. There are so many to pick from *- Twinkle, Little Star, The Wheels on the Bus -* are only a couple. Songs are sung throughout the day: at transition times, snack time, on our walks and on the playground. We sing about butterflies, horses, acorns, birds, apples and the sun. On Fridays we have All-School Sing and all the children and teachers in the ELC join together to sing our favorite songs, fingerplays and movement games.

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When children hear all this language, look at books, sing songs and recite fingerplays, they are learning language. It is one of the most important things we can do for our young children. So please read, sing and talk to your children every day. You are ensuring that they will develop into literate school age children. To help you on your literacy journey, I've included the lyrics to some of our favorite songs/fingerplays.
