Early Child Development



EARLY LEARNING CENTER

68 children received high-quality early care and education. We expanded and improved our outdoor classrooms.

EARLY INTERVENTION

We partnered with 108 families to help their children reach developmental milestones.

EARLY LEARNING EXPRESS BOOKMOBILE

678 storytime visits were delivered to 36 different sites in Windham County. We also raised funds to purchase a new custom vehicle!



Safe Housing

FAMILY SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

We served 61 families with 125 children in their search for stable housing. 31 families who were experiencing homelessness now live in affordable housing.



HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

Our site plan was approved for the first phase of The Village at Winston Prouty: 28 apartment units in a three-story modular building and 22 parking spaces.

EMERGENCY FAMILY SHELTER

Our temporary family shelter closed in June. 53 children from 26 households were able to call our campus home and connect with our case managers as they sought permanent housing.

Access to Healthcare



RESPONSIVE NURSING

Our nursing team responded to 162 referrals for prenatal and postpartum support.

EARLY CHILDHOOD & FAMILY MENTAL HEALTH

In partnership with Health Care and Rehabilitation Services, we responded to 49 referrals for consultation to support children's social-emotional health.

Successful Families

FAMILY SUPPORT

We partnered with 22 families to help them access community support and achieve health, education, economic, personal, and parenting goals.

SUPERVISED VISITATION PROGRAM

We facilitated over 400 supervised visits and exchanges for families across Vermont, New Hampshire, and from as far as California.



CHILD CARE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE & REFERRAL

We supported 572 families in applying for tuition assistance for 1029 children, and helped 57 families in their search for child care.



PARENTS AS TEACHERS

We delivered home-visiting parenting support to 10 families including 3 single fathers.

Recreation & Community



EVENTS

We hosted 6 opportunities for our community to gather, including free events like the Sandglass Theater Puppet Show and Day of Play and fundraisers like Bingo and the Foliage 5K.

PARENTING SUPPORT GROUPS

Our prenatal and postpartum groups cultivated connection and resource-sharing among 40 families. 8-12 children attended Prouty Playgroup every week.

CAMPUS

We used grant funds to build trail map kiosks and educational signage to enhance public use of our campus trails.



PARTNERSHIPS

Our staff participated in ongoing cross-sector partnerships including the Housing Coalition of Southeastern Vermont, One Brattleboro, and the Child Care Counts Coalition.

Access to Nutritious Food



FARM TO SCHOOL

Our Garden Coordinator facilitated 50 hours of garden instruction. Children in the ELC grew and tasted over 25 varieties of fresh produce.

CHILD AND ADULT CARE FOOD PROGRAM

265 children at 21 child care programs were served nutritious snacks and meals.

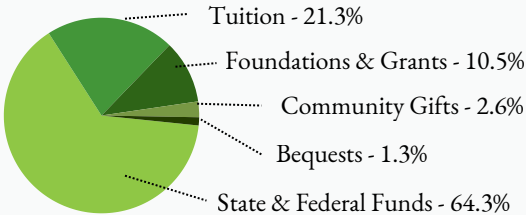
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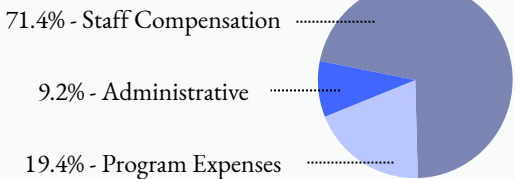

July 1, 2024 - June 30, 2025*

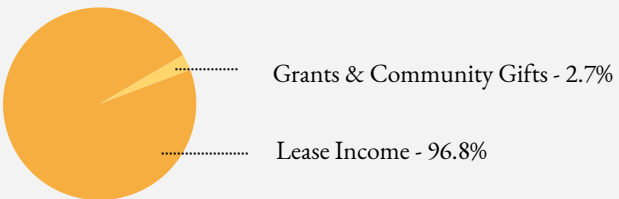
Program Income: \$4,159,018



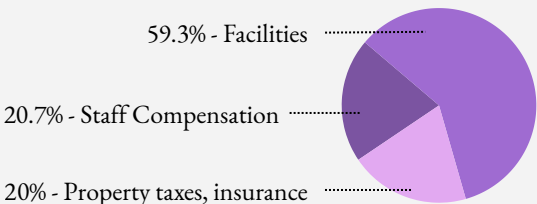
Program Expenses: \$4,014,292
